I was a big fan of Dickens when I was growing up and I think this was due to his social commentaries on poverty, injustice and the plight of the most vulnerable people in Victorian times. The need to address these social injustices always resonated with me and inspired me to go into politics.

Demon Copperhead holds up a similar black mirror to society as Dickens, whilst also being full of the same humour, tragedy and, most importantly, hope for a better future that characterised his work.

The book won the 2023 Pulitzer Prize, but is a very accessible due to the humour and strong characters and would make a great summer read. ??




